

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
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# A Message from the Principal

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

n Saturday, August 5th, the Franciscan Brothers celebrated their 165th Anniversary of service to the Church and the Franciscan Family with a Mass at Our Lady of the Angels Chapel and a dinner reception all at Saint Anthony's High School.

This year at the Portiuncula celebration we honored 3 individuals who embody joy, hope, service, respect and compassion. Each has given witness by their concern for the poor and the dignity of the human person. Mary Jane Tunny led a lifetime of nursing endeavors that included, to name a few, these positions: Associate Director of Nursing at Downstate Medical Center; Oncology Clinical Specialist at Downstate Medical Center; visiting nurse for NY Methodist Hospital; and visiting nurse for Nursing Sisters Home Care. The highlight of her nursing career, a dream come true for Mary Jane, the pinnacle began in 2003 when she accepted the position of Health Care Coordinator for the Franciscan Brothers of Brooklyn and Long Island. That blessed position far above all others, brough ther Christian values and faithfulness into stark focus; so much so that it emblazoned her entire life's work with a profound meaningfulness she never imagined was possible.

Born in 1933 and raised in Brooklyn, NY, Deacon Bob Campbell, O.F.S., was ordained in 1985 and professed as a Secular Franciscan in 1991. He served on the Tau Cross Regional Council for twelve years and created and maintains the Regional Database. Deacon Bob has been the editor of the Fraternity newsletter for Blessed Raymond Lull and is currently the Fraternity Secretary. He also serves on the committee for Franciscans Living in Community.





# Feast of the Portiuncula 2023

Brother Joshua DiMauro, O.S.F., hailing from Saint Finbar's Parish in Bensonhurst, entered the Saint Francis Novitiate in Upper Brookville on July 1, 1968. He donned the Holy Habit of Saint Francis on January 5, 1969, and took his profession on July 6, 1970. Brother Joshua next entered the Brother Columba Reilly Scholasticate while attending Saint Francis College in Brooklyn Heights earning a Bachelor's Degree in Math Education while also studying Music at Hunter College. He began his teaching apostolate in the 5th-8th grade at Saint Francis Xavier Grammar School in Park Slope from 1972-1974. Brother completed his Master's Degree in Music from University of Notre Dame in 1979 and post-graduate studies in Gregorian Chant from the Abbaye Sant Pierre de Solesmes (France), Catholic University of America and Westminster Choir (Princeton). He also hold certificates in Italian Language and Culture Studies from the Centro Linguistico Dante Alghieri (Florence) and the Scuola Leonardo da Vinci (Rome). In September 1974, Brother was assigned to Saint Anthony's High School in Smithtown, in the Mathematics Department. Brother has also served as Assistant Principal, Dean of Student Activities and Prefect of Discipline for Freshman. In 1983, Brother began conducting the Chorus, which today has over 600 voices and has traveled on thirty-three International Concert Tours performing before Saint John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI and Pope Francis. In 1999, Brother Joshua was elected to the General Council of the Franciscan Brothers and has served as Secretary General for the last 24 years. Brother continues to cherish the value of Catholic Franciscan Education each and every day at Saint Anthony's High School. Among his favorite quotes, comes from Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini, "We have an eternity to rest!".

n the evening of June 7th at 7 pm, Mr. Paul Paino, Director of Science Research, and selected members of FriarQuest, the Saint Anthony's Science Research Program, introduced the program to approximately 60 incoming members of the Science Scholars Program and their families. The evening began with an introduction to the Science Scholars Program and the fundamental objectives of FriarQuest. This introduction was followed by a presentation by juniors Aidan Cazalet and Madalynn Bernstein who spoke about their award winning environmental research regarding the condition of the waters of New York State. They were followed by senior Kiera Bowden who presented her highly acclaimed paper on factors that affect student coping mechanisms when dealing with anxiety and stress. Finally, senior Miah Margiano spoke about her three remarkable years of cancer research, highlighted by her two invitations to the Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair and her recent invitation to Washington DC where she received her \$25,000 scholarship to The University of Pennsylvania for being one of only forty 2023 Regeneron Science Talent Search National Finalists. Miah's presentation was followed by the presentation of awards in local science fairs and this year's National Honors Group in the Toshiba ExploraVision Competition. The evening ended with the introduction of our professional laboratory internships for the summer of 2023.

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From Classroom to Construction Site: A Journey with Habitat for Humanity
















# Vincent Tenety: A Legacy of Vision, Courage, and Compassion.





ack in 1980, in commemoration of the first annual Vincent C. Tenety Award, Mr. John Madden said, "...we of Saint Anthony's again thank God for the presence in our lives of Vincent Tenety: a blind man whose generous spirit taught us to see, a man in a wheelchair whose courage taught us to stand tall in the face of adversity, one of the meek who, having secretly inherited the earth, gave it back to us, renewed in meaning." The award was presented to Senior Paul DiFalco whose unwavering commitment to his team and teammates exemplified Mr. Tenety's extraordinary and moving devotion to his family and students. The award is presented each year to a Saint Anthony's student athlete.

Vincent Tenety would not have liked all of the accolades bestowed upon him. In life, Mr. Tenety wanted to be treated like any other Saint Anthony's faculty member. John Madden, Donal Buckley, Ed Vilbig and others did just that - teasing and joking with Vincent about just about everything, even his blindness. From the moment he began at Saint Anthony's in September of 1974, Mr. Tenety and his guide dog Opal felt a part of the Friar Family.

As a young boy, Vincent was diagnosed with juvenile diabetes. He was relatively healthy through childhood and as a young adult. He attended Fordham Prep in The Bronx on scholarship and later attended Fordham University where he received his BS in Accounting and later earned his CPA. By age 31, Vincent was a Division Controller at a Fortune 500 company. He married Joan, who was a teacher, and everything seemed to be going incredibly well for the young couple. At 33 years of age, with three young children and one on the way, Vincent suffered his first eye hemorrhage which was the beginning of a steady decline in his eyesight and health. He endured over 20 operations in his lifetime, but was completely blind at 40 years old.

Mr. Tenety did continue to commute into the city, using a cane and, later, his guide dog Opal. At the time, his son Kevin was attending Saint Anthony's and was dating a Holy Family girl named Muriel Rogers. Muriel was taking an Accounting class at Holy Family and often discussed it with Mr. Tenety. The family would read Muriel's textbook to Mr. Tenety and that is when he came up with a plan! Vincent met with Brother Venard, the Principal at Saint Anthony's, and proposed that he teach an accounting class. He did not need a salary because he was now disabled with a pension and able to make do with what he had. He just wanted to share his knowledge with the young men at Saint Anthony's. Vincent's sister, Carole Tenety Howard, offered to drive her brother to and from school. Carole herself later joined the Saint Anthony's staff as a secretary. His wife and children Vincent, Kevin, Anne and Eileen, along with a few neighbors spent the summer reading the textbook onto cassette tapes. Vincent would review the tape and the related overhead transparencies with the help of his daughters to prepare lessons each evening. Brother Venard could not turn the proposal down and Mr. Tenety began teaching in September 1974.

In the Fall of 1979, Mr. Tenety tried to return to work, however, his health was declining and he was now restricted to a wheelchair. Vincent Tenety passed away in November and his beloved guide dog Opal was done with her job. She had been a loyal and faithful guide and companion who gave Mr. Tenety his independence and allowed him to share his knowledge of accounting with the students at Saint Anthony's. Mr. Tenety's love for the school was passed down to the next generation that he never met. In addition to his two sons, eight of his twelve grandchildren are Saint Anthony's graduates.

The Tenety Family was eternally grateful to the Guide Dog Foundation and America's VetDogs, which are headquartered in Smithtown.

At 62 years of age, Kevin, SA '74, retired from his corporate accounting/finance position at Estee Lauder. He and his now wife Muriel decided to explore volunteer opportunities at the Guide Dog Foundation. Kevin was somewhat surprised at the variety of opportunities to help. There were those who came to the Foundation to play with or socialize the dogs. There were volunteers who worked in the office, helped transport dogs and clients and pitched in at fundraising events. There were those who fostered breeder dogs and those who provided temporary homes ("camping") when puppy raisers needed to be away. Mr. Tenety's daughter Anne Keller, and her husband Jamie, have been breeder caretakers for the Foundation for over 25 years.

Kevin and Muriel decided to become puppy raisers. They went through raiser training and got their first puppy, named Love, in December 2019. Kevin took the lead in working with Love, a beautiful and smart vellow Labrador Retriever. Wherever Kevin went, Love was there too. She rode the subways in New York, accompanied the Tenetys to restaurants, family events and even visited libraries and museums. Kevin raised Love for 15 months and then it was time to return her to the foundation for three months of intense formal guide dog training. Love was then matched to her person and is happily living and guiding in Rochester New York.

Kevin and Muriel got their second puppy, Pearl, in August 2021. Pearl is very high energy and after completing guide dog training was eventually "career changed" and is loving her exciting life as an explosive detection dog.

Kevin and Muriel are planning on getting another puppy to raise soon but are taking a little break as they await their first two grandchildren. In the meantime, Kevin is camping puppies and has joined the Guide Dog Foundation's speakers bureau to represent the Foundation at educational, fundraising and business association events.

The Guide Dog Foundation and America's VetDogs of Smithtown do some remarkable work. Today, the dogs are not only trained to assist people who are blind or have low vision, but they are also trained to assist veterans and first responders with disabilities. Some dogs are trained to perform many different tasks, including nightmare interruption for veterans or first responders with PTSD. With a welltrained guide or service dog by their side, individuals with disabilities get to live life on their own terms.

Kevin and Muriel Tenety will continue to work closely with the Guide Dog Foundation for people who are blind and first responders in honor of a great man -Vincent Tenety.




## A Golden Anniversary... Class of 1972 Returns to Saint Anthony's in Grand Reunion

A sa student at Saint Anthony's Shanell Blanchard '08 was driven. Throughout her journey as a Friar, she developed a true love for academia. That passion has not only stayed with her, but has also flourished as an adult.

For four years Shanell studied French and Latin here at Saint Anthony's. Shanell explained that it was Dr. Christina Buehler's ability to juggle being an excellent teacher and work on her PhD in French Literature that "instilled a love of learning that drives me to pursue academia relentlessly." She also taught Shanell the valuable lesson that time management is the key to success. Another very influential teacher in Shanell's

life was Ms. AnnMarie Fabricatore, her AP Language teacher. Shanell recalls, "I was terrified prior to each AP Language class because Ms. Fabricatore would demand the best and nothing less. And, although at times I felt that I was being tortured, I have never encountered an essay, article or research paper I could not handle because of her tutelage and guidance." Shanell continues to be grateful to her teachers at Saint Anthony's for giving her a strong foundation.

Upon graduation Shanell attended a small private college in Ohio called Hondros College for her Nursing degree, and she completed her Bachelor's in Nursing with Chamberlain University. In high school, Shanell thought of becoming a physician. She did a lot of shadowing and got a great deal of exposure to the healthcare field through her mother who is also a nurse. Shanell said, "When I got to college, I realized that I preferred to have direct contact with the patients. I love interacting with patients especially when you are playing a part in helping them to get well."


Shanell has worked in long-term facilities as a nursing supervisor and as a Director of Nursing. For the last nine years she has worked for Northwell Health. Initially, Shanell worked as an Oncology Nurse with patients in all stages of their cancer journey. She currently works as a Clinical Nurse Specialist to assist patients in connecting with all specialties. Although she loved clinical nursing because she "was able to impact patients' health in a more concrete way", she said, "Clinical nursing can be tough and some days as an Oncology Nurse were heartbreaking."

In administrative nursing Shanell found the opportunity to potentially change how nursing is practiced. She gained satisfaction from working on the expanding telemedicine services that are beneficial to patients that could not access healthcare previously. Although there are pros and cons to both clinical and administrative nursing, Shanell said, "I do miss seeing my patients more often." After getting exposure to an anti-human trafficking program which Northwell was spearheading, Shanell decided to pursue her law degree. She had recently completed her Master's in Public Health and was assisting in creating a program that would help healthcare providers identify victims of human trafficking. It was through her interactions with all the other healthcare partners such as social workers, physicians, nurses and lawyers that Shanell wanted to do more, policy-wise, to effect change in protecting such victims. Her next step on her journey began.

Deciding to go to law school brought about a major change in Shanell's routing and she needed to secure family support. "Law school is usually a full-time 3 year program which is all consuming, but I needed to continue working so lenrolled in a part-time program that could fit into my schedule. Shanell stated, "It was honestly the toughest and most trying 4 years of my life, but it made me resilient." Shanell attended classes on Sundays and would do her assignments throughout the week. She advised, "I recommend that someone who is considering law school but still has to work, that they secure all family support they can get. The law school journey does not just involve the student, but also his/her family because of time commitment involved." Having a family support system who understands your commitment to your work makes the journey easier.

Shanell offered some good advice for current Saint Anthony's students who are considering a profession. She says, "Really expose yourselves to the industry which you are considering pursuing. It was pivotal to my decision-making to shadow my mentors because I could see the day-to-day activities of nurses and lawyers. I saw how exciting and how hard it could be at times. What we see on television is not really what it is like. And having an honest and informed view always makes for better choices. Also, don't give up if things do not work out as you planned. The right path will come to you when you least expect it." Back in 2012, Richard Blount '12 was a very busy student here at Saint Anthony's. He was Senior Class President, a Schola member, a Show Choir member and track athlete who specialized in hurdles, long jump and high jump. Although his life was a little hectic, Rich states he loved every minute of his time here.

Much of his love for Saint Anthony's is rooted in those faculty and staff who left an indelible mark on him. Rich explained, "There was Paul "P Wash" Washington(a Government teacher and Football Coach at the time) who was this handsome, big guy that you literally looked up to. He would sit and talk about anything, even if you weren't on the football team." Another man who greatly influenced Rich was Brother Joshua. He said, "Brother Joshua was a real stickler, but I had never seen a man who was so dedicated and passionate about everything he did." Rich Reichert, who was Rich's PE teacher would "talk to you



about goals and what you wanted to do in the future. A man with so many championships, so much success and a super genuine guy." Mrs. Terry Kiernan instilled in Rich a "real love of Math which is evident in my career." Senora Maritza Acosta taught Rich "to love language and to be loving." His teachers had a profound effect on him.

He was also greatly impacted by his track and basketball coaches. JV Basketball Coach Tom Custance cut Rich as a sophomore. This was devastating to Rich. He had played all his life and knew he was very undersized here. He stated, "I remember Durelle Napier giving me a big hug when I found out I was cut. He told me just keep working and "when you step on the court, you have to think you are the best person out there and nobody is going to stop you". But after some discussion with Athletic Director Don Buckley, Coach Custance decided he would take me. He made me a point guard. He could make a role player a superstar. He was such a great instructor and so encouraging. His team was like family." Coach Herbert, Rich's track and field coach, was the first person to tell Rich that he was "a natural athlete." Rich added, "Tough love was the way he coached us, but he pushed us and what seemed negative at times was what propelled us to work harder. He had a heart of gold. He actually bought me my first pair of real running shoes. He was always giving us extra gear he received at meets, etc. He was just one of those men who was caring to all of us."

Upon graduation, Rich attended Hofstra University, joined ROTC and was a Mechanical Engineering major. Rich found the program very demanding and he was not earning the grades he wanted. After some discussion with his ROTC Commanding Officer, Rich made a big decision and enlisted in the Army National Guard. For eight months, Rich trained as a helicopter mechanic. In 2015, he enrolled in SUNY Farmingdale and changed his major to Visual Communication and Graphic Design. Again, the influence of a Saint Anthony's teacher played a big part in his choice of major. "Mrs. Mastrodomenico taught Art History back then. She opened my eyes to my own artistic talent and to look at the whole picture when studying art." This course of study led to Rich becoming a freelance graphic designer and photographer for clients in multiple facets of business and entertainment.

While studying at Farmingdale, Rich worked full-time in the National Guard and was based out of Farmingdale. Rich was assigned to be an Honor Guard at military funerals. He also was tasked with training new soldiers on properly folding the flag, standing at complete attention, properly marching to burial sites. Rich said," I really enjoyed helping people say their last goodbyes, however, some of the younger soldiers' funerals were difficult."

In 2021, Rich was assigned to the State Covid Response Mission where he oversaw the operations of pop up test sites – tracking testing, vaccines, soldier movement and logistics. When the Army was asked to go into nursing homes, Rich assisted soldiers with getting their EMT training. It was a very different assignment than he, or any of the other soldiers, had ever experienced.

In 2021, Rich volunteered for a deployment to Iraq where he would work as a helicopter mechanic. Prior to his departure in June 2022, he was trained and reclassed as a Black Hawk mechanic. In August of 2022, he flew off to Baghdad, Iraq. There he worked side-by-side with fellow soldiers, foreign nationals and military from around the world. Mrs. Acosta's AP Spanish class came in very handy when working with the Spanish soldiers! In November of 2022, Rich was relocated to Kuwait where he again worked as a helicopter mechanic. It was in January of 2023 that Rich was stationed in Al Asad Air Base In Iraq. For Rich, this was the best part of his deployment. Although he was a Staff Sergeant, Rich said, "I humbled myself because I was new to the Black Hawk. I would step back and listen when anyone of the surrounding soldiers could teach me something. During this part of my deployment, I was surrounded by an amazing group of soldiers and felt a part of a family." His deployment ended in May 2023.

Now back at home, Rich will take a few months before he reports to The Eastern Army Aviation Training Site in Pennsylvania where he will train soldiers to reclass helicopter mechanics. Rich said, "I often looked at my classmates who were becoming doctors and lawyers. I didn't really feel a part of. However, I am certain that the military is where I should be and I hope to continue for decades." When asked, Rich

explained two tattoos on his forearms. One says "Slick Rick which is a reference to his father Ricky Blount who he lost at age two to lung cancer." I grew up hearing about how commanding he was. How tall and handsome he was and how he carried himself. He was endearing and loved by all." The second tattoo says PROLIFIC which is a reference to a Nipsey Hussle song that begins, "I'm prolific, so gifted. I'm the type that's goin' to go get it."

Staff Sergeant Richard Blount is truly prolific and dedicated to his life's work. He would undoubtedly make his father "Slick Rick" very proud as he, too, is commanding, handsome and loved by all.







# A Friar's Legacy at the Cross Bay Swim

This year Brothers David, Vincent, Etienne and Ms. Creighton, Mrs. Regina and Mrs. Welling were spectators at the Annual Maggie Fischer Cross Bay Swim. It was great to see so many Friars participating and remembering Maggie. In 1999 the swim was dedicated to the memory of Maggie Fischer. She passed away just a few days before its' revival; she was scheduled to be a competitor.

Maggie was a seventeen year old senior at Saint Anthony's High School, born and raised in Brightwaters. In seventeen years she achieved more than what most could hope to do in a lifetime. She was one of the top students in her class, an accomplished member of the crew and swim teams, a great snow skier, a gifted flutist, and a dedicated lifeguard to the Saltaire community.

Maggie was a fourth generation Fire Islander. Both of her greatgrandparents owned homes in Ocean Beach. Her fraternal grandparents summered on Fire Island since the early 1900's and were married in the Church in Ocean Beach in 1943. Maggie first visited her parent's Saltaire home when she was only 3 weeks old. Fire Island was a part of her very soul.

Maggie was the type of person who was described by friends as being "extremely generous and kind-hearted." She continually strived for perfection and most often achieved that goal. Maggie loved just having fun and the Swim is dedicated to that memory of her; the memory of the way she fully lived her life and of all the amazing things she accomplished in her seventeen years. Maggie is truly a Friar Forever!

Thanks to the generosity of family, many Saint Anthony's alumni, and family friends, a second Maggie Fischer Memorial Scholarship has been established and all of the proceeds from the 2023 Maggie Fischer Cross Bay Swim will provide the initial investment into the new scholarship. # Brennan O'Neill and Doug Schreiber Rack Up Top Honors in an Epic Year

e are thrilled to extend our heartiest congratulations to Brennan O'Neill on being honored as the 2023 Tewaaraton Award Winner. This prestigious accolade is reserved for the most exceptional American college lacrosse players in the nation. As a junior, Brennan further distinguished himself by securing the title of the



2023 ACC Offensive Player of the Year. He spearheaded the Duke Blue Devils' journey to the NCAA Final, tallying an impressive career-high of 95 points—the highest in Division I this season. Moreover, his stellar performance as the MVP for Team USA at the Lacrosse World Championships stands as a testament to his exceptional skills. Remarkably, Brennan was the sole college athlete on the Team USA roster, yet he led the team in points.

The celebration was doubly special as Saint Anthony's Assistant Coach, Doug Schreiber, was honored with the Tewaaraton Legends Award. This award celebrates extraordinary players who graced the field before 2001—the inception year of the Tewaaraton Award. Doug Schreiber's illustrious career in lacrosse encompasses roles as a player, coach, and official. He boasts multiple achievements, including two-time first-team Junior College All-American and Nassau Community College Most Valuable Player honors. After transferring to the University of Maryland, he continued to shine as a two-time first-team All-American and was the captain of the 1973 NCAA championship team. He also clinched the title of the 1973 ACC Most Valuable Player.

This has indeed been an extraordinary year for Coach Keith Wieczorek'86 and the entire Saint Anthony's Lacrosse Program. The Varsity team concluded the season with an exceptional record of 12-1 and secured a distinguished #2 national ranking. Adding further acclaim to the program, the Friars won their fourth straight Catholic League and State Championship and University of North Carolina Chapel Hill bound senior, Owen Duffy'24, was named the US Lacrosse Northeast Player of the Year and US Lacrosse National Player of the Year.

A noteworthy group of alumni are the members of the dominant athletic program that Saint Anthony's has developed over time and continues to build on its tradition. It takes a team to accomplish greatness, but there are always exceptional student-athletes who make an indelible mark on their team. At the Saint Anthony's High School Hall of Fame Athletic Awards Dinner on June 13th, 2023, forty-two of these inspirational role models were inducted into the Saint Anthony's High School Hall of Fame for their accomplishments on and off the field.

The saying "Classmates for four years, Friars forever!" resonates deeply with every student who attends Saint Anthony's, and the friendships made often develop into family. Both John-Kevin Dolce ('06) and Ryan Barnett ('04) corroborated that ideology about the school when they talked about how it feels to be a part of the Friar family. "Make sure to make good friendships. Sports accolades and winning is important of course, but 5, 10, 20 years after you graduate, the friendships you made and the ones that persisted are going to be what really matters" stated elite golfer Barnett. Dolce also spoke about the importance of companionship as he was honored for being an outstanding multi-sport athlete during the induction. Dolce expressed joy at the fact that even 17 years after graduating from Saint Anthony's, he still holds special connections with so many people from his class, as well as many he shared the room with that night.

What separates Saint Anthony's from other schools is its people. One such person is a former Saint Anthony's swimming prodigy. Elizabeth Darcy-Welling ('92) was another force in the pool posting impressive feats throughout her high school career. Welling came back to Saint Anthony's after college and has taught in the Theology department for many years. As was previously mentioned, Saint Anthony's is not just a school centered around athletics.

Hall of Fame Inductee Marc Sambach ('73) of the Saint Anthony's Hockey program may have only been a student for four years and served as the hockey teams first ever captain, but he watched year by year as the hockey program as well as many other programs grew from the ground up, creating a special destination for athletes, and a unique experience that he defines as "scholarship, character, and faith". Working for more than fifty years behind the bench for the Friars, Sambach has seen many players come and go as they grew into young established adults that would go on to make big impacts in the hockey world and beyond. Sambach's influence on young hockey players across Long Island and in the community has made his name a staple for any youth hockey players looking to better themselves, whether it be for their skills, or their character.

Kaitlin Krause ('02) was an all-star caliber swimmer throughout her four years with the Friars, and when asked what advice she would give to the current and future Friar athletes that are in her former position, she shared "If you know your passion, follow it and if you don't know your passion, find it". Krause herself followed her passion for swimming through the collegiate level and beyond, bringing her to the present day where she is using her expertise to raise awareness for a rather dangerous but often forgotten issue. She recently established her non-profit Rising Tide Effect to provide water safety education and free swimming lessons to the most underserved communities in New York City, with the goal of decreasing water related injuries and deaths in these areas.

Five families were inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2023 (Burke, Maue, Pomper, Sirignano, Trombino) for their athletic prowess, and the impact they had here at Saint Anthony's High School. One of these families was none other than the Trombino family - Brian ('02), Peter ('03), and Christopher ('06). The Trombino's were gifted multi-sport athletes and leaders during their four years for the Friars. All three brothers elaborated on what got them to where they are today, and attributed the work ethic the school instilled in them to the reason for their well-rounded success. When Brian Trombino was asked his emotions when he first learned he and his two brothers would receive the honor, his mind first went to his Dad. Brian continued by describing how he had wished their Dad was able to see the accomplishments they had earned that night, and that he was and will remain deeply missed.



#### Q: What is your favorite movie?


BDM: Well...The Bells of Saint Mary's, Ben Hur and The Good Liar
